

Noli me tangere

Icon by Metochion of Simonos Petras, Annunciation of the Theotokos Convent, Ormylia, Chalkidiki (c. 1985)

The Icon "Noli me tangere" shows the appearance of the Resurrected Christ to Mary Magdalene as described in the Gospel of John,

Jesus said to her, 'Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, "I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." (John 20.17)

The earliest works on this theme can be found in Italian religious art dating back the 14th century, though in these Mary Magdalene is always depicted with an uncovered head, her hair flowing freely. This was a sign of immodesty, related to the misidentification of Mary Magdalene with the "sinful woman" in Luke 7:36-50, which we now know to be incorrect. Accordingly, modern iconography honour Mary Magdalene, the "Apostle to the Apostles", with her hair covered, as with other female saints.

THE SERVICE OF LIGHT

A blazing fire is prepared in a suitable place outside the church. When the people are gathered there, the presider approaches with the ministers, one of whom carries the paschal candle.

Then the presider greets the people and addresses them in these or similar words,

▲ In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Dear brothers and sisters, on this most sacred night in which our Lord Jesus Christ passed over from death to life, the Church calls upon her sons and daughters scattered throughout the world, to come together to watch and pray. If we keep the memorial of the Lord's paschal solemnity in this way, listening to his words and celebrating his mysteries, then we shall have the sure hope of sharing his triumph over death and living with him in God.

The presider blesses the fire.

Let us pray.

O God, who through your Son bestowed upon the faithful the fire of your glory, sanctify ★ this new fire, we pray, and grant that, by these paschal celebrations, we may be so inflamed with heavenly desires, that with minds made pure we may attain festivities of unending splendour. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Blessing of the Candle

After the blessing of the new fire, an acolyte or one of the ministers brings the Easter Candle to the presider, who cuts or traces a cross in the wax, and then traces the Greek letter alpha above the cross, the letter omega below, and the numerals of the current year between the arms of the cross. Meanwhile, the presider says,

When the cross and other marks have been made, the presider inserts five grains of incense in the candle in the form of a cross, saying,

The presider lights the paschal candle from the new fire, saying,

May the light of Christ, rising in glory, dispel the darkness of our hearts and minds.

The presider lights the candle, which the deacon holds aloft and sings:



Tapers of the sanctuary party are lit from the candle, then the procession resumes. The people's tapers are lit during the procession. Then the deacon stops and sings again, a little higher:

The light of Christ!

Thanks be to God!

The procession resumes, and on entering the sanctuary the deacon sings again, higher still:

The light of Christ!

Thanks be to God!

\P The Easter Proclamation of Christ's Resurrection (*Exsultet*)

Rejoice, heavenly powers! Sing, choirs of angels! Exult, all creation around God's throne! Jesus Christ, our King, is risen! Sound the trumpet of salvation!

Rejoice, O earth, in shining splendour radiant in the brightness of your King! Christ has conquered! Glory fills you! Darkness vanishes for ever!

Rejoice, O Mother Church! Exult in glory! The risen Saviour shines upon you! Let this place resound with joy, echoing the mighty song of all God's people!

My dearest friends, standing with me in this holy light, join me in asking God for mercy, that he may give his unworthy servant grace to sing his Easter praises.



Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give our thanks and praise.

It is truly right that with full hearts and minds and voices we should praise the unseen God, the all-powerful Father, and his only Son, our Lord Jesus Christ.

For Christ has ransomed us with his blood, and paid for us the price of Adam's sin to our eternal Father!

This is our Passover feast, when Christ, the true Lamb, is slain, whose blood consecrates the homes of all believers.

This is the night when first you saved our ancestors: you freed the people of Israel from their slavery and led them dry-shod through the sea.

This is the night when the pillar of fire Destroyed the darkness of sin!

This is the night when Christians everywhere, washed clean of sin and freed from all defilement, are restored to grace and grow together in holiness.

This is the night when Jesus Christ broke the chains of death and rose triumphant from the grave.

What good would life have been to us, had Christ not come as our Redeemer?

Father, how wonderful your care for us! How boundless your merciful love! To ransom a slave you gave away your Son. O happy fault, O necessary sin of Adam, which gained for us so great a Redeemer! Most blessed of all nights, chosen by God to see Christ rising from the dead! Of this night scripture says: 'The night will be as clear as day: it will become my light, my joy.'

The power of this holy night dispels all evil, washes guilt away, restores lost innocence, brings mourners joy; it casts out hatred, brings us peace, and humbles earthly pride.

Night truly blessed when heaven is wedded to earth and we are reconciled with God!

Therefore, heavenly Father, in the joy of this night, receive our evening sacrifice of praise, your Church's solemn offering.

Accept this Easter candle, a flame divided but undimmed, a pillar of fire that glows to the honour of God.

Let it mingle with the lights of heaven and continue bravely burning to dispel the darkness of this night!

May the Morning Star which never sets find this flame still burning: Christ, that Morning Star, who came back from the dead, and shed his peaceful light on all of us,



Please extinguish your tapers.

Lord of all life and power, who through the mighty resurrection of your Son overcame the old order of sin and death to make all things new in him: grant that we, being dead to sin and alive to you in Jesus Christ, may reign with him in glory; to whom with you and the Holy Spirit be praise, honour and thanksgiving, now and in all eternity.

THE MINISTRY OF THE WORD

¶ First Reading – Acts 10.34–43

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

Peter began to speak to those assembled in the house of Cornelius. 'I truly understand that God shows no partiality, 35 but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. 36 You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ – he is Lord of all. 37 That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: 38 how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. 39 We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; 40 but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, 41 not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. 42 He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. 43All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name.'

¶ The Easter Anthems

Sung by the choir.

- 1 Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us: therefore let us keep the feast;

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Colossians.

If you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. ² Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth, ³ for you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. ⁴ When Christ who is your life is revealed, then you also will be revealed with him in glory.

¶ Gospel – John 20.1–18

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Saint John, chapter 20, beginning at verse 1.

Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. 2 So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, 'They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him.' 3 Then Peter and the other disciple set out and went towards the tomb. 4 The two were running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. 5 He bent down to look in and saw the linen wrappings lying there, but he did not go in. 6 Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen wrappings lying there, 7 and the cloth that had been on Jesus' head, not lying with the linen wrappings but rolled up in a place by itself. 8 Then the other disciple, who reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; 9 for as yet they did not understand the scripture, that he must rise from the dead. 10 Then the disciples returned to their homes. 11 But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; 12 and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet. 13 They said to her, 'Woman, why are you weeping?' She said to them, 'They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him.' 14 When she had said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. 15 Jesus said to her, 'Woman, why are you weeping? For whom are you looking?' Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, 'Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away.' 16 Jesus said to her, 'Mary!' She turned and said to him in Hebrew, 'Rabbouni!' which means Teacher. 17 Jesus said to her, 'Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, "I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." 18 Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, 'I have seen the Lord'; and she told them that he had said these things to her.

RENEWAL OF BAPTISMAL PROMISES

¶ The Blessing of Water

Dear friends, let us humbly beseech the Lord our God to bless this water he has created which will be sprinkled upon us as a memorial of our Baptism. May he graciously renew us, that we may remain faithful to the Spirit whom we have received.

After a brief pause, the presider proclaims the prayer,

Lord our God, in your mercy be present to your people who keep vigil on this most sacred night, and, for us who recall the wondrous work of our creation and the still greater work of our redemption, graciously bless ₹ this water. For you created water to make the fields fruitful and to refresh and cleanse our bodies. You also made water the instrument of your mercy: for through water you freed your people from slavery and quenched their thirst in the desert; through water the Prophets proclaimed the new covenant you were to enter upon with the human race; and last of all, through water, which Christ made holy in the Jordan, you have renewed our corrupted nature in the bath of regeneration. Therefore, may this water be for us

a memorial of the baptism we have received, and grant that we may share in the gladness of our brothers and sisters, who at Easter have received their Baptism. Through Christ our Lord. **Amen**.

Please stand. Then the presider says to the people:

Dear friends, through the paschal mystery we have been buried with Christ in Baptism, so that we might walk with him in newness of life. And so, now that our Lenten observance is concluded, let us renew the promises of Holy Baptism, by which we once renounced Satan and all his works and promised to serve God in the holy catholic Church.

And so I ask you:

Do you renounce sin, so as to live in the freedom of the children of God? **I do.**

Do you renounce the lure of evil, so that sin may have no mastery over you?

I do.

Do you renounce Satan, the author and prince of sin?

I do.

I ask you now to reaffirm as yours the faith of the Church.

Do you believe in God the Father almighty, Creator of heaven and earth?

I do.

Do you believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord, who was born of the Virgin Mary, suffered death and was buried; rose again from the dead and is seated at the right hand of the Father;

I do.

Do you believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting.

I do.

The presider concludes,

And may almighty God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has bestowed on us forgiveness of our sins, keep us by his grace, in Christ Jesus our Lord, for eternal life. **Amen.**

The presider then sprinkles the people with water.

¶ Greeting of Peace

Christ is risen! Alleluia, alleluia!

He is risen indeed. Alleluia, alleluia!

The peace of the Lord, crucified and risen, be always with you. **And also with you**.

As one body and one holy people, may we proclaim the everlasting gospel of Jesus Christ our Lord, through whom, with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all glory is yours, eternal God, now and for ever. **Amen.**

Or

Blessing and honour and glory and power are yours for ever and ever. Amen.

¶ The Lord's Prayer

As our Saviour Christ has taught us, we are confident to pray:

The presider breaks the bread.

Lord, we died with you on the cross.

Now we are raised to new life.

We were buried in your tomb.

Now we share in your resurrection.

Jesus, Lamb of God, have mercy on us. Jesus, bearer of our sins, have mercy on us. Jesus, redeemer of the world, grant us peace.

¶ Invitation to Communion

Alleluia! Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us.

Alleluia! Let us keep the feast.

All receive Holy Communion.

THE SENDING OUT OF GOD'S PEOPLE

The presider or another minister says,

Christ our Passover has been sacrificed, alleluia; therefore let us keep the feast with the unleavened bread of purity and truth, alleluia, alleluia.

Then the presider says,

Heavenly Father, you have delivered us from the power of darkness, and brought us into the kingdom of your Son: grant that, as his death has recalled us to life, so his continual presence in us may raise us to eternal joy. Father,
we offer ourselves to you
as a living sacrifice
through Jesus Christ our Lord.
Send us out in the power of your Spirit
to live and work to your praise and glory.

Any notices or other announcements may be made at this point.

¶ Hymn

Jesus Christ is risen today, Alleluia! our triumphant holy day, Alleluia! Who did once, upon the cross Alleluia! suffer to redeem our loss. Alleluia!

Hymns of praise then let us sing unto Christ, our heavenly king, who endured the cross and grave sinners to redeem and save.
